Leave Everything in God's Hands and You Will See God's Hands in Everything You Do (Isaiah 41:9-10)

That Isaiah verse in the title: that's what I decided to do 16 years ago. I knew I was getting older and had to go one way or the other. Either work harder and longer to make more money, or give our future to God and see what happens. Wow! did God show me hundreds of times what He would do and DID DO. So many things, I can't list them all by paragraphs. I can only make an informal list of some of them to show the many ways I've seen God's hand in what He had planned for us. God gets all the praise, glory and honor for all He has done!

- Started my own remodeling/ handyman business several years earlier (Christian Handyman).
- Started helping homeless people get out of the woods they were using as their home. I am a Vietnam Vet, so to see people sleeping in the woods, mainly single homeless men, was not acceptable to me.
- Used our own money to give the homeless shelter in motel rooms.

Now here's the miracles He has performed for us!

Miracle 1: Asked God to let me do one or the other-- work in my business or give me the finances to help the homeless. He answered in a strange way. At the same time we had a recession and my business went to zero calls per week from many calls per week.

But He also knew I would be able to take retirement funds in a couple months so we would have some income besides my wife's salary.

My wife, who is the number one Miracle in my personal life (that's another story) said, "Are you crazy? We can't afford the \$1,000 you've spent on

motel rooms." I said, "Oh, I didn't think of that because God said in His Word He would take care of everything if I obeyed His Greatest Commandments and believed the Gospel." Boy did He ever!!

Miracle 2: Neighbor gave us a \$1000 a week later because he heard we were helping the homeless, not knowing how much in debt we were in helping them. (Got me off the couch, HA!)

Miracle 3: Found out through local Community Council there was a grant we could apply for through our electric company and at that time we weren't a 501(c)(3) public charity. Their "Operation Round-Up" Program had just begun and we received \$5,000. This was spent rapidly on motel rooms, clothes, food, cell phones, gas etc. for the homeless.

Miracle 4: Electric company put an article on us in their monthly magazine Rural Missouri, and we unexpectedly received over \$25,000 in donations from all over the state.

Miracle 5: A media frenzy began after that. I was interviewed by T.V., radio, newspapers and more and the donations just rolled in faster than we could spend it.

Miracle 6: The word got out to many organizations and we were told we needed to become a 501(c)(3) public charity so we could become legal and reputable. We got calls from a lawyer and a CPA accountant and they did all the paperwork pro bono to become a 501(c)(3) Public Charity. It happened so fast. Only three weeks after the application was submitted, it was approved by the IRS!

Miracle 7: We had to form a board of directors and were able to recruit many top businessmen and even a mayor of Wentzville to join in our cause.

Miracle 8: Then the awards started coming. About 9 awards for improving Racial Equality and Social Justice. These were from the City of St. Louis, St. Charles, Wentzville, St. Peters, Crider (now Compass Health), and more. We also received proclamations from the Missouri House of Representatives and Senate. Later we received the Senior Citizens Award from Missouri Lt. Gov. Peter Kinder.

Miracle 9: Commerce Bank awarded us with their Community Service Award and hosted a banquet for 100 people and provided a \$6,500 grant to our favorite charity. (Wonder who that would be? HA!)

Miracle 10: I then learned more about helping the homeless and was able to counsel spiritually and practically to all the thousands of homeless and working poor who somehow know to call ME for help.

Miracle 11: Decided that we needed to provide more than motels for shelter and housing for the poor. We did what we could afford and bought eight mobile homes for permanent housing for the working poor after our clients graduated from our motel ministry. Helped other agencies with permanent housing in our mobile homes also for their clients. Now we have one of the most affordable housing programs in the area because we own the homes and don't charge them to rent the home or ask for any deposits. They just pay lot rent and utilities.

Miracle 12: We discovered transportation is a big barrier for the poor in becoming self-supporting, which is the main goal for our clients. I did some investigation and discovered we can buy good high mileage cars that we can afford for them. Now we have bought 27 cars for clients.

Miracle 13: More than 9,000 homeless and fragile families have been helped with temporary housing in motels, 64 people from 24 families in the mobile homes, and providing 11,659 days of permanent housing. God has given us over \$2.5 million to do this, not even asking for most of it. God just provided.

Miracle 14: Also started a Trucker Ministry, where it all began at the local truck stop in Foristell and have ministered to nearly 5,500 drivers in 20+ years.

Miracle 15: Most important of all we have seen many clients become selfsupporting with jobs, transportation and housing that could have only happened through God's Miracles!

Now our goal is to buy 50 more cars and 50 mobile homes for the working poor if God okays that and sends more miracles and lots of donations! Just think, if 50 homeless or working families have a car, a decent job and

met. From there they can advance to better jobs,


cars and homes.

Special Car for Special Client

Ryan called one day after Christmas and asked if I could help him with some bills. Upon further questioning I found out he had eight kids, four living with him, all adopted, and he was separated from his wife. He said he was paraplegic and has had many surgeries in the past for his condition.

If that's not enough, his specially-equipped van had recently been stolen! He was renting a duplex in O'Fallon and has been supporting all his family on his social security disability income of about \$1,100/month.

I listened to all this and I couldn't help but think, "This guy needs a car!" Then I told him I could possibly buy him a vehicle. After he heard this he started crying profusely and said he couldn't believe it. After asking "Is this real"? many times, he finally asked when I could come meet him.

I told him he should start looking for a high mileage van at about \$3,500. First he found some in St. Louis and other far away places. I told him that was too far. Surprisingly, he called the next day and said he'd found one a couple of miles from his home. We bought the 2006 Mazda SUV for less than we planned. Now he can make it to doctor appointments and take his kids to their events.

FSBH has been able to acquire 27 vehicles for fragile families in our service area over the past couple of years. If you have a good used car that you'd like to donate, just let us know!

Warmth for the Body, Soul and Spirit on Frigid Winter Night

Warmth for the body, soul and spirit for the homeless at **Economy Inn** one frigid winter night. After dinner was lovingly served by ladies from **Assumption Church**, we enjoyed listening to the acoustic guitar music of **Paul Baxter** while we passed out coats, donated puzzles, and new blankets from **Dave McClaskey** of **BO15**, **Inc.** O'Fallon, along with snacks for those staying inside from friends at **Faith United Church of Christ**, Wentzville. About 20 were blessed for the evening.

Economy Inn was just one of many local motels that was lodging the homeless for the 15-day arctic blast that hit our area in February through the **Emergency Weather Response (EWR) Program** that operates when temps are less than 20 degrees. The EWR has been operational over the past four winters, but this year, due to COVID, it was necessary to use motels instead of churches for most of the lodging.

More than 2,000 bed nights of lodging were provided to about 200 people, according to the preliminary reports we have received. The cost was estimated to be about \$50,000! Thanks to a highly successful last minute "GoFundMe" appeal, enough money was raised to keep the program operational until the bitter cold ended.

Rolling Meadows Mobile Home Park Events

Due to COVID we've had a hiatus in events at the mobile home parks, except for a successful "Drive Thru" Thanksgiving Dinner last November.

Plans are under way for a Kids 5 Day Club to be hosted by Grace Community Chapel using Child Evangelism Fellowship (CEF) materials for the last week of June. That is all tentative, pending COVID status closer to the time. Grace Chapel was the group to fund the playground we placed there, and the hope is to have the VBS-type program happening around the playground area.





Drive Thru FSBH Christmas Wonderland

The 12th Annual Christmas Wonderland, sponsored by FSBH, was held COVID-style December 19, 2020 on a relatively warm winter day (54 degrees and sunny) in the parking lot at the Wentzville United Methodist Church. The rally from the community was so evident this year with more than 400 Bibles from Matthais' Lot Church, St. Charles, snacks for 535 people from Grace Community Chapel, St. Peters, 200 laundry baskets from several groups including Mercy Health Care and clients from Mission Financial in St. Peters, and ministry friends who organized smaller collections. Diapers were provided by Crisis Nursery, and toys from Toys for Tots along with other FSBH ministry supporters were given to 232 children.

Thrivent Action Team: Laundry Baskets Filled for Needy Families

First Step Back Home, Inc. is a homeless ministry that has received funding through Thrivent over the past seven years. Twenty-one Thrivent members have allocated nearly \$6,000 from their Thrivent Choice Dollars to help us cover the costs of supporting the critical needs of the homeless and working poor from the western suburban area of St. Louis region in St. Charles, Lincoln and Warren Counties. Each year one of our biggest community outreach events has been the FSBH Annual Christmas Wonderland, a festive "Happy Birthday Jesus" party including a luncheon, entertainment, Santa and lots of gifts and activities for children. One of the most popular parts of this event has been the provision of filled laundry baskets for each family that attends. The focus has been on blessing the poor and economically-disadvantaged families in our area.

December 19, 2020 was the date for our 12th Annual Christmas Wonderland. It was held at Wentzville United Methodist Church. The provision of filled laundry baskets has been happening for the past 10 years or so, and was spawned by the anonymous receipt of 10 tote bags filled with laundry detergent, fabric softener, bleach and a roll of quarters many years ago when our event was small and held at the local motel where the homeless were lodged. The families that received those bags were so touched by the generosity of the donor that it impressed us as a very practical way to bless others as part of our Christmas provisions.

We created a comprehensive list of items that could be packed into sturdy laundry baskets and started to distribute that throughout the year to churches and organizations who wanted to help us help others during the holidays. Some years the number of baskets that came in was sufficient; other years, we ran short, never really knowing how many people or laundry baskets might come in ahead of time.

One group that felt led to support our cause this year was a family from **Good Shepherd Lutheran Church**, Manchester, MO who decided to create a **Thrivent Action Team**. Led by **Mike and Sandy King**, this couple put together five baskets for part of their church's donation. Here are some thoughts from **Sandy** about all of this:

"Really all I did was take the seed money that Thrivent gave me, \$250, and put together five more baskets for part of our churches donation. Since I was being very careful about COVID, I picked up all the supplies in the parking lot at Target. I ordered them online with the **Thrivent Action Team** Visa Card, and in a few hours they brought everything out to my car in their parking lot. That made it super easy, although I had to do more than one order because cleaning supplies were limited.

When I got those together I still needed to add a few more things which I did, and added my own basket that I had donated, and my husband and I took the six baskets, plus some others that had been delivered by other church members to the venue location in Wentzville on Friday, December 18. Janie Wolfangel and Dennis Mall also drove their cars with more baskets at the same time. At the venue location we were met by FSBH volunteers who took our 40 baskets plus many others that were being delivered at the same time. It was inspiring to see all those baskets that had been put together for people in need, knowing they would be distributed to them the next day.

I would really like other Thrivent members to know how easy it is to apply for a grant that can help the projects that are being done by different groups and people in our congregation. Over the past three or four years, I've seen many projects that could be helped by a **Thrivent Action Team** grant. All Thrivent members get the opportunity to apply for two grants each year from Thrivent. Maybe my story could help others make good use of these opportunities."






FSBH Client Services for 2020

Here's a snapshot of where your donation dollars got spent last year. The data shown below details services rendered by FSBH for clients throughout 2020. Motel stays and assistance to purchase vehicles were the largest expense areas this past year, followed by rent assistance, utility, assistance and car repairs for fragile families. Nearly 300 families, including 185 children, were assisted in one way or another.

Kim is an old client who has been helped with assistance for utilities and cell phone minutes in the past. In early February she called to tell me her spouse **Jeff** was laid off because of COVID. Also, she said there was no food in their house, and they had their heat turned down as low as possible to save money and to keep things from freezing.

I offered to meet her at a grocery store and agreed to pay her utilities again. Then she told me she was already at a gas station near my house and her tank was on empty. She didn't know if she could get to a grocery store. She and her little daughter **Rainna** were crying because they were stranded and family only had one car. I met them at the gas station, filled their tank and then we went drove to the grocery story close by to get some food. They both stopped crying and smiled because I had brought them a cart full of food for their family of four. We loaded up her car and they went home happy and safe, with a full tank of gas and a car full of food. She told me her family prays every day for their needs to be met, trusting in Jesus!

Kim and Jeff are both recovering from drug addictions in the past. They have been on the right path since 2018 and say the ONLY way they could overcome their addictions was through a relationship with Jesus. They both went through recovery programs at Mission Gate and are so very thankful for the healing and restoration that only Jesus could bring to their lives. At this point in his career, Jeff is praying to find an opportunity to learn a trade like welding so he can provide better for his family in the future.
