

Putting God's Word into Practice

I found over 80 verses and many articles explaining how we need to not just read the **Bible** but put its words into practice. What good does it do to have all the good, excellent, life-giving, lifesaving, loving, helpful, life-changing information from the **Bible**, but then not do anything constructive and productive with it? With so many commands, demands, and advice connected with acting on **God's** word, what more convincing do we need to be **doers** of **God's** Word and not **hearers** only? (James 1:22)

Talking about the Commandments, John 14:15 says, "If you Love me, you will keep my Commandments." That's just another way to show **Jesus** we love Him, such as James 1:22 says.

Hebrews 4:12 tells us **God's** Word is active, sharp, piercing, and discerning the thoughts and intentions of the heart. All this! But some people (as I used to be), just sit on His words and don't act on them. Sounds like a sin to me!

Ephesians 2:10 says, "We were created to do good works." This is another verse that explains our purpose here on earth. If this is our purpose then, acting on **God's** words is what we should be doing with most of our time.

Why do we say **good works** are the greatest things we can do? Well, it's because of the Greatest Commandments (Luke 10:27). They say to love **God** first and your neighbor next. We look at the "neighbor" as the least of our people . . . the working poor and homeless. So, to us loving and helping the poor is the best of the **good works** we can do.

So, what are **good works**? Titus 3:14 says "they are the overflow of Love for **Jesus** that meets the needs of others." If we love **Jesus** we will love and help the poor, who are the least of the others. **Jesus** said this is the most important thing we can do on earth! **Jesus** spent a lot of time helping people and setting an example for us to follow. I think this is what He means by saying, "**Follow Me**"- physically going and doing what He does.

This is the Why of our ministries! I saw people living in the woods, which I don't call living but barely surviving. I am a Vietnam Vet and I couldn't stand

to see this so I started helping them with motel time, food, clothes, cell phones, bikes and cars and plans for finding jobs and eventually housing. Now in 19 years we have helped thousands of "neighbors" and have spent thousands of dollars doing it. **God** in **Jesus'** name must be happy with us because He continues to send funding, people and resources to enable us to operate the 10 ministries we have now for the homeless and working poor among us. Most of our clients have experienced a better, and for some, self-supporting lifestyle; living in transitional and/or permanent housing. It seems like the demand gets greater, but funding just doesn't keep up with it all.

God's provisions are the **How**. St. Charles, Lincoln, and Warren Counties are the **Where**, And seven days a week is the **When**. We would rather people call us Monday through Friday 10 am to 5 pm, but that never seems to happen because of our clients' unpredictable circumstances.

Putting God's Word into Practice (continued from Page 1)

Recent statistics from Housing and Urban Development reveal that there has been a 12% increase in homelessness in the past year nationwide, and it's 15% in Missouri. In addition, thousands of working poor need help to keep their housing. So, needless to say, we need help! We receive more than 60 calls each week and most take a lot of time to help.

For example, nearly 3 months ago a client called us about their home burning down. Ever since then, we have been providing funds for everyday essentials like ID replacements, showers, laundry, food, clothing, fuel for kerosene heaters and car repair. They are living in a small broken-down camper next to where the house in the country was, and have no electricity, water, or anything else it takes to survive even now. They are happy to receive any help they can get. Things are looking up because more people are trying to help them. But they still must wake up every morning to look at the burnt mess outside their door. Black charred ashes are where the house was. Insurance is a tricky situation and not coming to them very timely, it seems.

These kinds of cases are most fulfilling when we see clients become happier and less depressed than they were before we started helping them. It is so enjoyable and a blessing to see people succeed from having absolutely nothing as far as housing and basic necessities. We can't figure out why more people aren't doing this. All social service agencies are overwhelmed, underfunded, and understaffed. We try to keep up with the demand for help. It is our opinion that if more ordinary angels (big-hearted people) would get involved and if we were to get more funding and staff, we could keep up with more of the many calls that come in daily.

So here is how you help the homeless:

- Start with learning about the existing agencies in your area and other support systems that help the poor. Then investigate the **Continuum of Care** division of **HUD** in your region. Here that's through the **Tri-County Continuum of Care** and the **United Way's 211** system. People who are homeless or about to be homeless dial 2-1-1 and follow the phone prompts to be connected to local resources. This system is the primary method **FSBH** receives referrals each day.
- Next, interview clients to investigate their past and current situations. Sometimes that includes doing a data search on Missouri Casenet. Call me and I can explain all this.
- Then list clients' past employment, skills, education, etc. If clients don't have jobs, make a recommendation for them to do job searches. We require they submit 15 applications per day and record the results. The best places we have found for quick employment and income are temporary employment agencies. Once clients get jobs they can start paying for housing and their basic needs in the motels we provide in the beginning.
- Once clients can completely pay their motel bills, you can help them progress further. That would look like more affordable housing, better and higher paying jobs/careers, and better transportation.

We pray clients can begin living in permanent housing and have a better life. We believe in always leaving people better off than where we found them. **FSBH** owns seven mobile homes which we can provide for those who qualify for permanent housing. This is the most affordable option and easiest to obtain in the area for the working poor. We could fill at least 50 more, but do not have the finances to buy additional ones.

This is just a brief rundown on how to help the needy if you feel called to do so. The **Greatest Commandments** say we all are!

We give **God** in **Jesus**' name all the Praise, Glory, and Honor for what He has done for us and has given to us to steward in our ministries.

One of the earliest transactions for this new ministry in February was for a client of **FSBH** who is staying at **Anchor House**. **Ella** needed a car, and donations had come in to **FSBH** for her benefit, so now she has reliable transportation!

Other donations came in for **Ella's** benefit, so she has graduated from homelessness to independence with housing and transportation. When she first came to us last Christmastime, we thought her situation was "impossible." But our awesome **God** has supplied in many ways for her well-being and for that we are very thankful. Do Invisible People Really Exist? by Paul Kruse

Basically, "Invisible People" are those who are at the bottom of the social order who have for one reason or the other, due to bad decisions or no fault of their own, become homeless. The reason they are said to be "those dirty, nasty-looking people" is because people who are doing well do not perceive them as human, and don't want to even look at them. They don't realize **God** looks at the soul of everyone no matter what they look like on the outside! (I Samuel 16:7)

Like, "Oh, look at that guy. He doesn't even seem real and looks unsafe!" as they pass by a poor person leaning up against a building or someone dressed in rags and unclean. They just don't view these people as visible or real people because of the way they appear or dress. They don't want to get involved because they are not equal to them. I know this, because I was once sort of like these folks before **God** opened my eyes to his Love for everyone!

The **Bible** says **God** Loves the poor and wants His people to demonstrate a compassionate and sympathetic heart towards them. Leviticus 25:35-36 says, paraphrased, to help the poor as you would a stranger, so they can continue to live among you. This reminds me of the **Greatest Commandments** that say, paraphrased, "Love **God** and Love your neighbor as yourself." There is a lot in that statement also. It agrees with the Levitical verse meaning to help raise the poor to the same status as you.

But how do we talk about helping the poor to increase in status as we are and help them to maintain that status and live among us? When we do that, we are helping **Jesus**. (Matt. 25:40) Luke 14:13-14 says, paraphrased, when you help someone in need, you will be repaid at the Resurrection of the righteous. Which means, when **Jesus** comes back the righteous will be chosen to go with Him! I want to be one of those persons, don't you?



We have a friend who runs a website called **Invisible People**. The lifelong goal of **Mark Horvath** is to raise awareness world-wide and institute public advocacy to solve homelessness. I have always said the only way to put a dent in the homeless problem is for more everyday citizens not connected to a social service agency to get involved. The need far outweighs the number of agencies and the support there is for them today! If **FSBH**, as a public charity, could get more funding, staff, and volunteers, I believe we could help everyone in our three-county area who is homeless. We could help them and realize at least a 50% success rate of giving them a much better life, a plan, and a program to increase their status in life. Many would become self-supporting and be homeless no more.

Here is an example: **Mark** came to me in early December and asked if he could interview two of my clients to put on his website to raise awareness and gain public involvement to help the homeless. He did, and I could not believe the unexpected results! You will read later in the newsletter how the videos of these two clients helped them tremendously overcome their plights of homelessness.

The **Invisible People YouTube channel** has 1.15 million subscribers. The two videos he produced on our clients' amazing stories have received more than a million views, more than 28,000 new views on our **FSBH** website and 220 new donors to **FSBH**, many of whom dedicated finances to these two specific cli-

ents. (See Page 5 for Kevin's and Ella's stories.) Those donations have come in from all over the world! Australia, Russia, China, Greece, England, Canada, Mexico and the USA! Most of the gifts have been sent by everyday citizens being "ordinary angels" working just like the ones featured in a movie of that name that is out now. Many have sent funds, made phone calls and provided special Christmas holiday treats for the children involved.

These donors are everyday people who have compassion and sympathy for our clients' miserable situations. This is exactly what we need more of - to raise awareness of what misery and depression poor people are going through and do something to help! Donating money is fine but we need people to be the personal strength and physical help the homeless and fragile families need to succeed as well.





Part of Ella's Story

Ella has progressed from the motel where we first met in mid-December, to getting into an apartment at **Anchor House** in Warrenton and getting a car through the new **Wheels of Faith** program. Much of Ella's progress has been made possible by the 250k Invisible People viewers, some of whom donated to FSBH so we could supply for her needs over the past 2 ½ months. Shortly after she moved to her stable housing spot, we shopped for a recliner chair. FSBH has been able to pay for lodging, get her new glasses, groceries, pay for part of the car purchase, provide fuel and laundry funds. All this is because of the generosity of donors sympathetic to her cause.

Over the past 2½ months **FSBH** has been able to help **Kevin** and his family of four children with lodging at a local motel, and to get him a much-needed new reliable vehicle, a 2013 Chevy Silverado. The Bridge Church also helps FSBH through the provision of meals at the local motels as part of our **Meal Ministry Program**.



7th Year For Emergency Response Team Activations



While March is finally here, and spring is really on the way now, it was once again another full season for the 65 or so volunteers who were on stand-by to serve at the seven locations used for 11 of the bitter cold nights we experienced this winter through the Emergency Weather Response Team of the Community Council.

This was the seventh year for this life-sustaining program, to provide warming centers throughout our three-county region for people on the streets when temps were predicted to

be 20 degrees or less. A total of 123 people were served this year, representing 70 households. Bednights added up to 124.

FSBH is pleased to be a part of this essential program for our unhoused neighbors. During the January frigid snap of several days, we were also able to help supply food and volunteers for the daytime services that were offered this year for the first time ever.

Operation Round Up Funds Help Cover Motel Stays for Homeless

Last November right before Thanksgiving Day, **FSBH** was blessed to receive a \$7,000 grant from the **Cuivre River Electric Cooperative's Operation Round Up (ORU) Program**. These funds are being used exclusively for motel stays for clients in our region. Over the past 19 years, the **ORU** Program has funded FSBH with \$133,000 for this cause. It is expected that the current grant will supply lodging expenses for 39 single

homeless or family units to have a 2 day stay at one of several local motels used for shelter.

While our primary program is to house men and help them get work through temporary employment agencies, we do also provide lodging for women and children who are not able to stay at places such as the Salvation Army, our Ladies Inn (pregnant) or Robertson Center (women facing abuse). People not willing to work are not accepted into the program.

If you live in a **Cuivre River Electric Cooperative** area, you can "round up" your monthly electric bill to be part of this program. For you it will only cost cents on the dollar. But those "cents" add up, and the **ORU** team has more than \$20,000 each month to distribute to worthy causes. We're grateful to be a part of this provision.

We also supply him with cell phones for clients he knows are serious about their job searches and progress.

We recently received a huge donation of 400 pairs of new men's socks from **Divvy-Up Socks** in Florida. We supply this ministry as well as our own clients with new socks when treasures like this are left at our doorstep.

Ed Kallery, founder of Mind the Gap, often stops by FSBH to pick up items he can pass out tailgate style during his Thursday evening connections with the street homeless folks in downtown St. Louis. We are often given items he and his clients can use, such as toiletries, socks, blankets, hats and coats.





15th Annual Christmas Wonderland










Why Do We Help the Homeless?
